



DECORATING SAFETY TIPS

As the holiday season gets into full swing, many families decorate to spread cheer and make their homes more festive. While holiday decorations can be fun and beautiful, they can also present fire hazards. To keep your home and family safe this holiday season, consider the following decorating tips.

Here are a few suggestions for your holiday decorating:

- Only buy electrical decorations that have a UL rating on the label, which indicates that they have been tested for safe use.
- Follow all installation and usage instructions for lighting decorations to ensure that you are not increasing your chance of starting a fire.
- Inspect new and used lights before using them and discard any that have cracks, exposed wires or loose connections.
- Do not connect more than three sets of lights to an extension cord at one time.
- Plug outside lighting only into a ground fault circuit interrupting (GFCI)| outlet, as this will safeguard the outlet from any interaction with water.

- Do not secure outside lights with staples or nails, and avoid placing indoor extension cords under carpeting, rugs and furniture.
- Unplug lighting decorations before going to bed and leaving the house.
- If you set up a Christmas tree, place the tree in a sturdy stand at least 3 feet away from heat sources.
- Keep your Christmas tree hydrated or it will dry out quickly and can become highly flammable.
- Don't hang ornaments lower than the bottom of the tree. Not only are they more likely to get knocked off or be eaten by your dog, but it doesn't look as clean and put together if the ornaments are showing under the last branches of the tree. If you look at any professionally styled tree, nothing hangs below the bottom!
- If you like to wrap your garland up the railing of the stairs, try tying it up every foot or so using Christmas ribbon instead of wrapping it around the banister. This not only stops the garland from falling and becoming a tripping hazzard, it also leaves the railing free to hold on to.
- If you hang your stockings above your fireplace, be sure thaey are we secured to avoid them from falling into the fire and also that they are high enough that they will not catch fire!

Home-related accidents can definitely put a damper on the holiday spirit. Your Uncle Bill may break his arm when he slips on your ice-covered front steps or your Aunt Edith might down too much bubbly, then get behind the wheel and cause an accident.

Safety Tips for Uncle Bill!

- Clear snow and ice from walkways, driveways and stairs before guests arrive.
- Make sure exterior lights are working.
- Apply double-sided tape or use no-slip mats to make sure area rugs are secure and don't turn into trip-andfall hazards.
- Remove clutter like toys, laundry and wrapping paper to decrease the odds of a guest slipping or tripping.
- Clean up spills as soon as possible so that a guest doesn't slip on a slick floor.

Your homeowners insurance usually includes coverage for injuries to guests. (You can bump up this liability limit and/or add umbrella insurance for extra coverage.)

Recommendations for your Aunt Edith!

Encourage guests who've been drinking to ride home with a designated sober driver. If that's not possible, arrange for a taxi or rideshare, or invite an inebriated guest to spend the night at your house or a near by hotel.

At your party or gathering, be sure that you serve plenty of food and nonalcoholic beverages. This may help to lower the chances of your guests becoming intoxicated.

As a social host, you may be responsible for the actions of your guests who gets tipsy at your home. That means you can be sued if a drunk guest leaves and causes an accident.

Preventing Frozen Pipes...

DRAIN PIPES that are likely to freeze, and turn off outdoor sprinkler and irrigation systems.

SEAL GAPS and holes that allow outside air into spaces where pipes and supply lines run.

INSULATE between pipes and outer walls.

PROTECT PIPES with heat tape, then wrap with pipe insulation.

INGREDIENTS/INSTRUCTIONS

60g unsalted butter, chilled, chopped

3 tbsp (1/4 cup) caster sugar 1/2 cup (55g) ground almonds 1/2 cup (75g) plain flour

36 ready-made mini pastry tart shells

Preheat the oven to 180°C.
